



You can go on a deer safari, observe the polar lights or ski in Russia From the Black Sea in the south-west to the Baltic Sea in the north-west, Russia is so vast it has 11 time zones. Its capital may be Moscow, but the cultural heart remains St Petersburg, which is often referred to as the second or northern capital. The place to be: Sochi

Russia's main health resorts are based around the Caucasian Mineral Waters found in Pyatigorsk, Kislovodsk, and Essentuki. Seaside spa resorts also flank the Black Sea coast in Sochi, Anapa, Gelendzhik and Tuapse. Sochi, the palm-tree capital of the 'Russian Riviera', only 15 miles north of Russia's southernmost border with Georgia, is due to host the 2014 Winter Olympics. There are plenty of other activities to do in Sochi, from visiting Stalin's villa

 once secretary of the Communist Party — to touring the beautiful botanical Park Arboretum. A multibillion-dollar airport is also in the pipeline.
